


TOWER BRIDGE

The bridge was built between 1886 and 1894. It was designed by Sir Horace James. Even though the suspension bridge that is designed with elements of a bascule bridge design is admired today, it received a lot of criticisms when it was first built.



ST. PAUL'S CATHEDRAL

St. Paul's is an Anglican church that was designed by Sir Christopher Wren. Its 300th anniversary was in 2010. The Dome is an iconic feature of the London skyline.



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TOWER OF LONDON

The whole name of the tower is *Her Majesty's Royal Palace and Fortress, the Tower of London*. The Queen has a house there if she wanted to stay there. Only 22 executions have taken place there, and before it was a prison, it was a defensive fortress.



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SHAKESPEARE'S GLOBE

The Globe holds about 1,500 people which is about half the original number of the original Globe. People these days are bigger and do not like to be squashed. Also, they didn't have safety regulations back then.



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LONDON EYE

It took seven years for five countries and hundreds of engineers to build this structure. From the very top of the wheel, a person can see within a 25 mile- radius; one can even see Windsor Castle on a clear day.
