ORSP Update: IRB Submission Software Coming Fall 2024

The Office of Research and Sponsored Programs is excited to announce that Cayuse Human Ethics, their new IRB submission software, will be fully implemented by Fall 2024!

Why are we so excited about this?

Cayuse Human Ethics will allow for electronic preparation of studies, submissions and routing. It is a cloud-based tool that facilitates submissions (including initial application, modifications, renewals and incident reports), reviews and routing. It will also send system alerts and notifications when there are pending tasks, such as when a faculty sponsor needs to certify a student application or when a reviewer has a pending review. Users will experience increased transparency of the status of study protocols throughout all phases of a protocol. This will effectively reduce the need to rely on email and will streamline ORSP's institutional process. Beginning Sept. 1, ORSP will no longer accept IRB applications via email. All applications, amendments, and renewals will need to be submitted via Cayuse after this date.
